Nov 3 - St. Hubert patron saint of hunters


St. Hubert reportedly had a vision of a crucifix between the horns of a stag while hunting. This vision help to convert him to Christianity.

Nov 11 - St. Martin of Tours

As a young soldier, Martin encountered a beggar in Amiens. The beggar was unclothed and it was very cold. Martin removed his cloak and with his sword, he cut it in half. He gave this half to the beggar and dressed himself in the remnant. Patron saint of soldiers.

Nov 13 St. Frances Xavier Cabrini

St. Frances was the first United States citizen to be canonized. She was dedicated to caring for the poor, uneducated, sick, abandoned, and especially for the Italian immigrants. She is the patron saint of immigrants.
